The year 2020 will go down in history as a very difficult and challenging year in many ways. With STAY AT HOME and SELF QUARENTNE no one knew what to do. The Bluebird committee at the Village of Loch Lloyd was no different from the rest of the United States. What should we do? We knew that the birds didn't know about Covid 19 and continued on with their lives. The Committee came up with a plan, since most of our boxes were on the golf course, if any of our team had a golf cart they could drive and check the boxes by themselves. Actually, if a family member wanted to ride with them, it could be done. There were 9 members of the team who were anxious to help every week.

On Monday mornings at 7:30 the excitement was brimming throughout Loch Lloyd. A schedule of boxes to check was given to each member and Out they went. With March 30th our start date, there were already a few boxes with activity,

nests, eggs and one nest with 3 babies. The season progressed and more and more activity being found.

The end of our season came on August 24th. We had many successes and a few sad finding with missing eggs and dead babies, but all in all the Loch Lloyd Conservation/Bluebird Committee had many fun and exciting Monday's. A recap of our totals, Bluebirds fledged, 365, Tree Swallows fledged, 164 and Carolina Wrens, House Finch, House wrens. Plus there were 15 house sparrow nests destroyed. The rest of the Committee members who couldn't participate will be happy to go out in 2021.

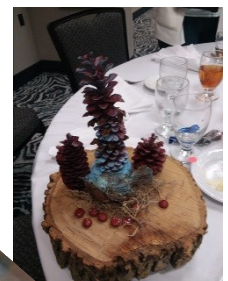
Bluebirds Across Nebraska!

The Miracle of Leaves

Did you know that an average tree holds about 225,000 leaves? I am not sure who counted them, but that sure is a lot of leaves, so they must be useful for something. Autumn draws our attention to leaves like no other time of year because of their colors and because many of us must rake them! Let's take a closer look at leaves to find out why they are important. Leaves come in a variety of sizes and shapes. No matter their design, all leaves share a common function. They all manufacture food for their host plant by an amazing process called photosynthesis. They do this by using the sun's energy to make sugars and starches that plants need to grow and reproduce.



What makes leaves so essential is that they form the basis of our food chain and ALL animal life ultimately depends on the ability of plants to produce food and oxygen by photosynthesis. Note the formation of a small bud (see red arrow) on the stem in the left of the photo which pro-

ducts new leaves overwinter until it bursts open the following spring when the weather warms.

For photosynthesis to occur, plants need water, carbon dioxide, sunlight, and a green pigment called chlorophyll found in their leaves. Plants obtain water through their roots. The water then rises to the leaves where, in the presence of chlorophyll, water is split into hydrogen and oxygen using the energy from the sun. Carbon dioxide in the air enters the leaves through leaf pores called stomata. The hydrogen gas available from the splitting of water combines with the carbon dioxide to form sugar, a compound containing carbon, hydrogen, and oxygen. The leftover oxygen is released to the air, replenishing what we and all other animals need for breathing. That is what I call a miracle. If it weren't for leaves, and phytoplankton in the ocean that produces about fifty percent of the world's oxygen, none of us would be able to breathe.

The primary trigger for leaves changing color in autumn is decreasing day length although temperature and moisture play



a role too. This causes chlorophyll production to stop and its green pigment starts to degrade and be reabsorbed by the plant. This allows the colors of other pigments like showy reds and yellows to show though that were previously masked by the green chlorophyll. This process is what gives us our spectacular autumn colors we enjoy. Besides giving us life-giving oxygen and food, leaves provide us with shade and cooling temperatures during hot summers all the while producing buds containing new leaves and flower parts that will burst forth with new life the following spring, all protected overwinter by their buds. The opening of buds and the development of new leaves and flowers in spring is another miracle of Nature. So, let's not take leaves for granted. Take a new look at leaves for all they do for us as our very lives depend upon them.

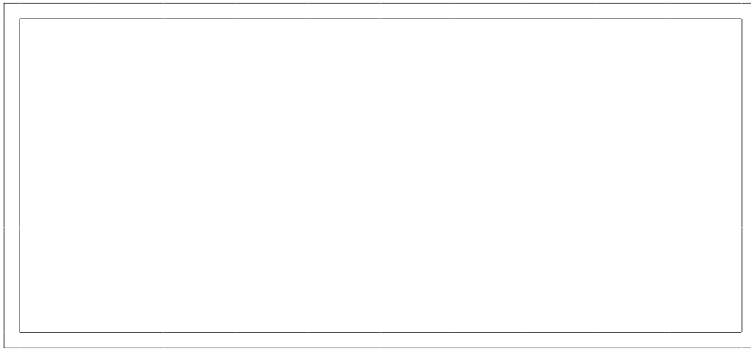
